

Our employees serve more than 53,000 full-time residents, and several thousand employee-based and vacation visitors daily. We maintain six divisions (prevention, disaster prep., EMS, suppression, training and administration) within a fiscal year operating budget of \$8.2M.

Emergency Services

Call Types Defined:

Assist: Smoke scare, request to investigate, etc.Hazard: Electrical wiring, flammable liquid spill, etc.Exposure: Fire that extends to secondary involvement.

Service: Assist invalid, check the welfare, etc.
Other: Provide personnel, etc.
Fire: Includes structure, brush and vehicle fires.


